





Mayoral Declaration on Enhancing Mayoral Leadership in Addressing Hate, Extremism, and Polarization and Safeguarding Local Democracy in the Americas

Cities Summit of the Americas Denver, Colorado April 28, 2023

We, the Mayors and other City Leaders gathered in Denver at the Cities Summit of the Americas, and in the context of the Democracy and Inclusion Track Session on Enhancing Mayoral Leadership in Addressing Hate, Extremism and Polarization, and Safeguarding Local Democracy in the Americas:

Recognizing that the historical roots of our countries are founded on diversity and multiculturalism and *condemning* the rising levels of extremism and hate, increased polarization, anti-government sentiment, and gender-based, inter-communal, and gang-related violence while *noting* that local officials are increasingly being targeted.

Expressing concern that misinformation, disinformation, and conspiracy theories are contributing to these worrisome trends.

Recognizing that mayors and other local leaders across the Americas have a unique, but sometimes overlooked, role to play in preventing and responding to these challenges, including by working in close collaboration with civil society and the communities they serve to strengthen social cohesion and create cities of belonging.

Appreciating that due to their proximity to and familiarity with local communities, mayors and other local leaders are well-placed to identify the priorities of their residents and develop innovative approaches to reduce inequality and discrimination and ensure access to public services.

Recognizing the role mayors can play in countering dis- and misinformation, for example, by sharing and making available fact-based, contextualized information in relevant local languages about events, including elections, public protests, and violent attacks, or access to social services, which are susceptible to being manipulated to generate or exacerbate inter-communal tensions.

Standing in solidarity with local leaders and communities who defend, promote, and protect the rights of their communities, minorities, migrants, and others who seek shelter and refuge in times of crisis.

Welcoming the leading role that the Strong Cities Network and the National League of Cities and other relevant country-focused networks in the Western Hemisphere continue to play in facilitating the sharing of local learnings among mayors and local governments.

Declare our commitment to, and *call on* all mayors and other local leaders from across the Western Hemisphere, to join us in:

- 1. Speaking out regularly and consistently against all forms of discrimination, disinformation, intolerance, hate, violence, and extremism.
- 2. Sending a clear and consistent public message of being an inclusive and welcoming city, recognizing that public safety and well-being begins with inclusion at the local level, and that inclusivity is the foundation for effective prevention and response.
- 3. Strengthening local democratic institutions, including by facilitating the active participation of all residents, especially women, young people, isolated or marginalized communities, and new arrivals, to promote and foster social cohesion, representative governance, and resilience.
- 4. Investing in building trust with and between communities so there are established connections when/if hate or extremism emerges or polarization rises, recognizing that authentic, trusted relationships with communities are essential for rallying support in moments of crisis, for addressing discriminatory historical or structural legacies or injustices, and building long-term community cohesion and resilience.
- 5. Promoting transparency and pursuing open dialogue between city authorities, civil society and communities, to understand peoples' lived realities and aspirations, including by creating safe spaces for difficult conversations (including about racism, injustice, and hatred) among cross-sections of the local population.
- 6. Considering hate, extremism, and polarization, and the violence that can manifest from these threats in their multidimensional and interconnected forms, including by investing city resources in and prioritizing analysis and practice that better understands this threat landscape, building capacity to collaborate around integrated prevention policies and programs that are multi-disciplinary and evidence-based, addressing local grievances, and remaining responsive to a continuously changing and increasingly interconnected and dynamic threat environment.
- 7. Promoting increased cooperation with national partners to ensure that the voices of cities and their communities are reflected in national, regional, and international policy frameworks aimed at reducing the threats posed by hate, extremism, and polarization.
- 8. Building cooperation with the Strong Cities Network, and other relevant networks and partners, to elevate and enhance the role of mayors and the cities they lead in preventing and responding to hate, extremism, and polarization, and safeguarding local democracy.

Express our further commitment to share with the Strong Cities Network on an annual basis the actions we have taken to implement this declaration.
